"I like to imagine my mind as a montage - a mismatched assortment of sparkle, handwritten notes, and an endless array of photographs, with just a slight sprinkle of stardust scattered on top. A cloud of red haze reflects off my smoke and mirrors, but you can just make out the silhouette of a girl who pretends to have everything figured out. If you were to, say, write a musical about the characters in my mind, Joy would probably take the leading role, but you can bet that every other emotion – from Anger to Nostalgia – would make an extremely dramatic entrance. I suppose what I'm trying to say is that I am fuelled by connection. Love is my default setting, and I don't think there's anything that sums me up more."

"Songwriting is my way of making sense of the what's happening inside – like turning emotions into paintings. There's a whole world in our heads – joy, sadness, fear, all fighting for space to be heard. When I write, I try to listen – and let them speak. It's less about telling a story and more about reliving a moment – and inviting you to step into it with me."

So as you can imagine, every emotion I've ever had - every sadness, every joy, every ounce of fear, even if it's brief, is 100% documented somewhere in some journal, or somewhere in my notes app. Or, most of the time, in my songs."


